of ointment of pure nard, very costly,  
and she broke the flask  
and poured it over his head.

John 12:1-8

Mary therefore took a pound of expensive ointment  
made from pure nard, and anointed the feet of Jesus  
and wiped his feet with her hair.

The house was filled  
with the fragrance of the perfume.

Mark 14:4-5

There were some who said to themselves indignantly,  
“Why was the ointment wasted like that?  
For this ointment could have been sold  
for more than three hundred denarii  
and given to the poor.”  
And they scolded her.

John 12:1-8

But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples  
(he who was about to betray him), said,  
“Why was this ointment not sold  
for three hundred denarii  
and given to the poor?”

He said this, not because he cared about the poor,  
but because he was a thief,  
and having charge of the moneybag  
he used to help himself to what was put into it.

But Jesus said, “Leave her alone.

She has done a beautiful thing to me.

But you will not always have me.

Luke 7:47

Matthew 20:2

“After agreeing with the laborers for a denarius a day,  
he sent them into his vineyard.”

1 denarius = 1 day's wage for a laborer  
(= say, \$100)

300 denarii = 300 days wages  
(= \$30,000!)



1 Corinthians 13:1-3

And if I have prophetic powers,
