Matthew 15:1-11:

He answered them, “And why do you break the commandment of God for the sake of your tradition...?

“You hypocrites! Well did Isaiah prophesy of you, when he said: ‘This people honors me with their lips, but their heart is far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrines the commandments of men.’”

Matthew 1:21-23:

“She will bear a son,  
and you shall call his name Jesus,  
for he will save his people from their sins.”

All this took place to fulfill  
what the Lord had spoken by the prophet:  
“Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son,  
and they shall call his name Immanuel”  
(which means, God with us).

Matthew 2:14-15:

And he rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed to Egypt and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet,

“Out of Egypt I called my son.”

Matthew 2:18:

Then was fulfilled what was spoken  
by the prophet Jeremiah:

“A voice was heard in Ramah,  
weeping and loud lamentation,

The commandments,

“You shall not commit adultery,

You shall not murder, You shall not steal,

You shall not covet,” and any other commandment,  
are summed up in this word:

“You shall love your neighbor as yourself.”

so that what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah  
might be fulfilled:

have seen a great light, and for those dwelling  
in the region and shadow of death,  
on them a light has dawned.”

Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to John, to be baptized by him.

John would have prevented him, saying, “I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?”

Matthew 8:16-17:

That evening they brought to him many who were oppressed by demons, and he cast out the spirits with a word and healed all who were sick.

This was to fulfill what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah: “He took our illnesses and bore our diseases.”

And many followed him,

Matthew 13:34-35:

All these things Jesus said to the crowds in parables; indeed, he said nothing to them without a parable. This was to fulfill what was spoken by the prophet: “I will open my mouth in parables; I will utter what has been hidden since the foundation of the world.”

and you did not seize me.”
